I hope you're ready to experience the arts, in person, at the beautiful Ford Center. We have stellar events, varied and diverse, that will appeal to a wide range of arts enthusiasts. Because the re-start is a little slow for the touring groups, we are offering the fall season only at this point.

Our spring season brochure will be available by October. We are bringing back shows that were canceled with a Broadway series (*Beautiful*, *Waitress*, and *An American in Paris*), plus adding a great blues event with Edgar Meyer, and a Saturday morning with *Dog Man*.

#### Highlights

 We are incredibly fortunate to bring the superb Renée Fleming to our performing arts center. Through the generosity of Nancye
B. Starnes, this will be a three-day event featuring Ms. Fleming leading *Music and the Mind* with regional guest panelists. We are privileged to offer this international star in concert the following evening. On Tuesday morning, Ms. Fleming will work with a few young singers in a vocal masterclass. These events are open to the public.

- Our season opener is the premiere of Voices of Mississippi. It will be another three-day event that will engage our students, faculty, and general public in lectures, masterclasses, and a phenomenal multi-media event featuring William (Bill) Ferris and well-known Mississippi musicians. We are pleased to collaborate with the Center for the Study of Southern Culture for this event.
- In collaboration with the Center for Inclusion and Cross-Cultural Engagement, we are bringing the Fannie Lou Hamer Story to the main stage. A Mississippian and activist, Ms. Hamer established a national reputation fighting for voting rights. Mzuri Aimbaye will engage students to join her on stage for her powerful presentation of Ms. Hamer's journey as a civil rights activist.
- Our new Pop Series brings you Bruce Hornsby, Post Modern Jukebox, and a Christmas show from The Beach Boys.



### Voices of Mississippi

Tuesday, Sept. 14 • 7:30 p.m.

Voices of Mississippi is an immersive multimedia experience and concert event that celebrates the people and art of the southern blues, gospel, and storytelling traditions. Based on and inspired by the acclaimed 2019 double Grammy winning four-disc box set of the same name, *Voices of Mississippi*, the program features musical performances by notable Mississippi artists plus archival film and images. The show includes fascinating personal narratives and accounts from Dr. William Ferris, founding director of The University of Mississippi Center for The Study of Southern Culture and former Chairman of The National Endowment for the Humanities.



#### **Renée Fleming**

WINNER OF FOUR GRAMMY® AWARDS

#### Ms. Fleming's appearance is sponsored by Nancye B. Starnes.

Renée Fleming is one of the most acclaimed singers of our time. In 2013, President Obama awarded her America's highest honor for an artist, the National Medal of Arts. In 2014, she became the first classical artist ever to sing the National Anthem at the Super Bowl. Winner of four Grammy® awards, Renée has sung for momentous occasions from the Nobel Peace Prize ceremony to the Diamond Jubilee Concert for Queen Elizabeth II at Buckingham Palace.

In 2018, Renée appeared on Broadway in a major new production of Rodger's and Hammerstein's *Carousel*, for which she earned a Tony Award nomination. Her recent tour schedule has included concerts in New York, London, Vienna, Paris, Madrid, Tokyo, and Beijing. She is heard on the soundtracks of the Best Picture Oscar winner *The Shape of Water* and *Three Billboards Outside Ebbing, Missouri*, and she will soon be heard as the singing voice of Roxane, played by Julianne Moore, in the film of the best-selling novel *Bel Canto*. As Artistic Advisor to the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, she spearheads a collaboration with the National Institutes of Health focused on music, health, and neuroscience.

Renée's most recent album *Distant Light* was released in 2017 by Decca. She has recorded everything from complete operas and song recitals to indie rock, jazz, and the soundtrack of *The Lord of the Rings*.

Among Renée's awards are the Fulbright Lifetime Achievement Medal, Germany's Cross of the Order of Merit, Sweden's Polar Music Prize, and France's Chevalier de la Légion d'Honneur.

#### The Fannie Lou Hamer Story

Mzuri Moyo Aimbaye channels Fannie Lou Hamer transfixing the audience in a riveting 60-minute journey of storytelling showered with eleven inspiring songs and a video montage of the Civil Rights movement. Ms. Aimbaye has the power of a warrior when she speaks and the voice of an angel when she sings evoking emotions with tears of joy and pain as well as sorrow and laughter. A critic once wrote, "When Ms. Mzuri sings God smiles and angels flap their wings". The audience will experience the courageous spirit and determination of Mrs. Hamer's emotional twists and turns in her triumphant quest for human dignity and freedom.



#### Andreas Klein Concert Project

### with Fine Arts Photographer, Andreas Rentsch

Thursday, Nov. 4 • 7:30 p.m.

Pianist Andreas Klein is offering a Concert Project with Swiss Fine Arts Photographer Andreas Rentsch whose body of work is an ongoing exploration of the connections of fate, geography, and politics in the direction of justice.

The first part of the program consists of the Bach Partita, a Chopin Ballade and Beethoven Sonata enhanced with light projection, beginning with white lighting progressing to more dramatic color palettes. After intermission, the images of photographer, Andreas Rentsch, will be projected onto the stage while Andreas Klein performs the Prokoffiev "Sonata No. 7."



#### An Evening with Bruce Hornsby

Sunday, Nov. 7 • 7:30 p.m.

Known for such hits as "The Way It Is" and "Mandolin Rain", Grammy-winner, Bruce Hornsby has built one of the most diverse, collaborative and adventurous careers in contemporary music. Drawing from a vast wellspring of American musical traditions, the singer/pianist/ composer/bandleader has created a large and accomplished body of work and employed a vast array of stylistic approaches. Throughout this period, Hornsby has maintained the integrity, virtuosity and artistic curiosity that have been hallmarks of his work from the start.

In addition to his work as Bruce Hornsby and the Range, he has collaborated with musicians such as Bob Dylan, Willie Nelson, Don Henley, Brandon Flowers (of the Killers), Elton John, Jerry Garcia, Eric Clapton, Sting and Justin Vernon (of Bon Iver). Hornsby opened for the Grateful Dead in 1987 which lead to him playing with the band in more than 100 shows in the early 1990's.

Hornsby's latest album, Non-Secure Connection, was released in August 2020.





#### STOMP

Monday, Nov. 29 • 7:30 p.m.

STOMP is explosive, provocative, sophisticated, sexy, utterly unique and appeals to audiences of all ages. The international percussion sensation has garnered an armful of awards and rave reviews, and has appeared on numerous national television shows. The eight-member troupe uses everything but conventional percussion instruments – matchboxes, wooden poles, brooms, garbage cans, Zippo lighters, hubcaps – to fill the stage with magnificent rhythms. The return of the percussive hit also brings some new surprises, with some sections of the show now updated and restructured and the addition of two new full-scale routines, utilizing props like tractor tire inner tubes and paint cans. ### Post Modern Jukebox

Saturday, Dec. 4 • 7:30 p.m.

From its Etta James-inspired rendition of Radiohead's "Creep" to its New Orleans jazz interpretation of Meghan Trainor's "All About That Bass," Postmodern Jukebox has established a sound like no other, crafting hits as exquisitely sublime as they are humorously absurd.

Today, the rotating supergroup devoted to period covers of pop songs – is a bona fide global sensation, having collected more than three million subscribers on YouTube while selling out major venues around the world and developing previously unknown talent into superstar singers.

### The Beach Boys

Saturday, Dec. 11 • 7:30 p.m.

As The Beach Boys mark more than a half century of making music, the group continues to ride the crest of a wave unequalled in America's musical history. The Beach Boys have become synonymous with the California lifestyle and have become an American icon to fans around the world.

Since the band's co-founder, lead-singer and chief lyricist Mike Love penned the lyrics to The Beach Boys' first hit, "Surfin" (1961), dozens of the bands chart toppers have become eternal anthems of American youth: "Surfin' USA," "Surfer Girl," "Fun, Fun, Fun," "I Get Around," "California Girls," "Help Me Rhonda," "Barbara Ann," "Good Vibrations," "Wouldn't It Be Nice," "Rock and Roll Music" and "Kokomo."

The Beach Boys have sold over 100 million records worldwide and have received more than 33 RIAA Platinum and Gold record awards. The Rock And Roll Hall of Famers were also honored at the 2001 Grammy Awards with the Lifetime Achievement Award.

With more than five decades of touring under their belts, The Beach Boys have performed more concerts than any major rock band in history.

Sounds Of Summer: The Very Best Of The Beach Boys, Capitol/EMI's 30-track collection of the band's biggest hits, has achieved triple-platinum success with sales of more than three million copies in the U.S. since its release.

The Beach Boys are led by Mike Love, who, along with longtime member Bruce Johnston, musical director Scott Totten, Brian Eichenberger, Christian Love, Tim Bonhomme, John Cowsill, Keith Hubacher and Randy Leago continue the legacy of the iconic band. This concert will not feature Brian Wilson, AI Jardine or David Marks.

## Gertrude Castellow Ford

Which is the arts of all manner of literary works and was not afraid to raise challenging concepts in literature, especially concerning the authorship of Shakespeare's plays. Always at the very foundation of her spirit was a great and sincere love of the arts and letters.

Raised in a generations-old tradition of philanthropy, Ford established the Gertrude C. Ford Foundation in Jackson with a generous gift in 1991. In 1998, the Ford Foundation awarded the University of Mississippi \$20 million to design and build the Gertrude C. Ford Center for the Performing Arts on the Oxford campus. This regal facility is a physical testament to Ford's lifelong dedication to the arts. Ford died in September 1996. She and her husband, Aaron Lane Ford, who was an Ackerman attorney and U.S. congressman representing what was Mississippi's 4th District, are buried in Cuthbert, a small town in southwest Georgia.
