Originally choreographed for composer Glenn McClure's oratorio, The Starry Messenger, this piece is an homage to Galileo's discovery of the heliocentric universe. It premiered with Rochester's chamber choir, Madrigalia, and was inspired by the New York Times bestseller, Galileo's Daughter, by Dava Sobel. Historians believe Galileo's artistic skills played a major role in his scientific breakthroughs. Likewise, the non-traditional partnering practiced by PUSH and its quest for a deeper understanding of the arts has led the company towards science. Galileo is, at its core, an attempt to realize the solar system in human form. This work was made possible by a generous grant from The Arts & Cultural Council for Greater Rochester.

PUSH Physical Theatre

Powerful. Provoking. PUSH.

Intense athleticism, gravity-defying acrobatics, and soulful artistry are the trademarks of award-winning, genre-defining PUSH Physical Theatre. Founded in Rochester, NY in 2000 by husband-and-wife team, Darren and Heather Stevenson, out of a desire to "push" the boundaries of conventional theatre, PUSH has since earned an international reputation as one of the U.S.'s leading physical theatre companies.

Featured in acclaimed collaborations with the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra, the Ying Quartet, and Pulitzer Prize-nominated composer Ricardo Zohn-Muldoon's two multi-media operas (*Comala* and *No Se Culpe* with fellow composer Carlos Sanchez-Gutierrez), PUSH has also produced its own full-length works including *DRACULA*, *Jekyll & Hyde*, and *Arc of Ages*. Additionally, its wideranging repertory includes many shorter works such as "Red Ball," a hilarious take on the interplay between the real and virtual worlds using iPad technology. Most recently PUSH has taken their multiple award-winning show *Generic Male*:

Just What We Need, Another Show About Men from two US and Canadian tours to an Off-Broadway run at the Soho Playhouse.

PUSH was a season finalist on TruTV's national series, *Fake Off*, a competition/reality show featuring what producers dubbed "the captivating art of 'faking'" – a mix of theatre, acrobatics, and illusion. Their performances caused judge and Glee star Harry Shum Jr. to exclaim: "You guys are superhuman!"

These masters of physical storytelling have received the Community of Color/Anton Germano Dance Award, the Performing Artist of the Year Award from the Arts & Cultural Council for Greater Rochester, and the University of Rochester's Lillian Fairchild Award.

In addition to a busy touring schedule, PUSH is passionate about arts-in-education programs and runs its own summer day camp for kids, teen training, and summer intensive for adult students from all over the world. More information is available at pushtheatre.org.

About the Cast

Darren & Heather Stevenson (Founding Artistic Co-Directors, PUSHers), Born and raised in England, Darren met New Jersey native Heather during their mutual studies at The Center in St. Louis. Their shared love of theatre and performing planted the seeds for their relationship and eventual collaboration.

After completing their studies at The Goldston & Johnson School for Mimes and touring together, the couple founded the Studio School of the Arts in Atlanta, Georgia. They relocated to Rochester, NY with their two children in 2000 and created PUSH Physical Theatre, growing it over the next 18 years into the international touring company that it is today.

Darren and Heather have created many new works for PUSH, including full-length adaptations of Bram Stoker's *Dracula* and Robert Louis Stevenson's *Jekyll & Hyde*. Shorter works include "Flight 1549," set to the audiotape of the miraculous airplane landing in the Hudson River; and "-abled," an exploration of addiction. Heather's touching look at the elderly in "The Visit" is a thought-provoking counterpoint to Darren's powerful take on war in "The Soldier." A grant from the Farash Foundation enabled collaboration with RIT's National Institute for the Deaf to create "Red Ball," a study of the real and virtual worlds using iPad technology. They created *Arc of Ages*, a full-length exploration of Jewish history and culture, which featured an unprecedented 23 physical theatre performers trained by PUSH.

The Stevensons received the 2009 Performing Artist of the Year Award from the Arts & Cultural Council for Greater Rochester, as well as the Community of Color/Anton Germano Dance Award. Darren was awarded the University of

Rochester's Lillian Fairchild Award in 2017 for PUSH's collaborative work on a multi-media opera that brought together U.S. and Mexican artists for premieres in both countries for the second time.

Cross-genre collaborations with other world-renowned artists are becoming more and more frequent for the genre-defining company, such as its recent partnerships with the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra and the Ying Quartet.

The Stevensons have also created a children's education division called PUSH Pins and are sought-after teaching artists, developing programs that help students connect with curriculum concepts, life skills, and social issues. They also run an annual summer intensive for adults that attracts students from all over the world.

Sarah Jacobs (PUSHer) is a dance educator, choreographer, and movement artist. She has worked with over two dozen choreographers and directors across dance, physical theater, and performance art, most recently in Los Angeles with Victoria Marks and Cheng-Chieng Yu/Yu Dance Theater; in Rochester, NY with Greg Woodsbie; and with Street Dance Activism's worldwide network for the 28-Day Global Dance Mediation for Black Liberation. Sarah is a Visiting Assistant Professor in Dance and Movement Studies at Hamilton College. She has taught at SUNY-Brockport, Scripps College, The Wooden Floor, and numerous K-12 schools, and been a guest artist at Washington & Lee University, Carleton College, and the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Sarah holds an MFA in Dance from UCLA and a BA from Carleton College. This is her second project with PUSH.

Rachel Kodweis (PUSHer) is an actor, director, and vocalist. In NYC, Rachel collaborated frequently with Casa Cruz de la Luna (Fausto Angleró, The Marquis de Sade is Afraid of the Sea), Cloud of Fools Theatre Co. (Dark Eyes, All That Dies and Rises), Green Space (Pullman Car Hiawatha, The Tempest), and Mettawee River Theatre Company (The Dancing Fox, 2014 tour). Alongside Jon Froehlich, she is co-founder and co-artistic director of Infinite Spark Theater Company (And They Never Recovered From The Shock, The Flower Debt). Having returned to Rochester, NY after a decade in New York City, she is thrilled to be collaborating with PUSH Physical Theatre again (2022: International Jewish Festival, Israel, 2013: Arc of Ages).

Ashley Jones (PUSHer) is a physical performer, actor, and deviser. After earning his BA European Theatre Arts from Rose Bruford College, London and training in Physical Theatre at Academia Teatro Dimitri in Switzerland, he went on to train with Phillipe Gaulier and Angela De Castro in theatrical clowning, which has formed a large part of his solo practice. As a physical performer, Ashley has worked and trained with UK-based theatre companies Gecko Physical

Theatre, Nonsuch Theatre, and Frantic Assembly. His recent credits include: *The Party's Over* (2017), *Eclipse* (2017), *The Russian Play* (2017) and *Into the Clouds* (2018). As Artistic Director of Theatre Kinaesthetic, Ashley continues to develop and produce his own work exploring physical modalities within ensemble and devised performance. His credits with Theatre KinAesthetic include Rite of Passage (2015, 2016).

James Cunningham (Lighting Designer/Technical Director) owns and operates Rockshow Lighting, a concert lighting design company providing design and staffing for music festivals, touring acts, and venues. Recent adventures include multiple national tours with folk-rock act Carbon Leaf, international runs with pop-reggae act SOJA, and festival stage designs and staffing for Floydfest and Red Wing Roots. James uses the grandMA2 console line for lighting control, and employs Resolume Arena for video playback and live effects.

Josefina Calzada-Garza (Costume Designer/Fabricator), a native of Mexico, has been a veterinary doctor, a ceramics artist, a jeweler, and now a costume designer. She met PUSH through their work on *No Se Culpe*, a multimedia opera that was co-composed by her husband, Carlos Sanchez-Gutierrez. "Life is very interesting and takes you on many paths if you let it!"

About Gertrude Castellow Ford



White an ever-inquisitive mind, Gertrude Castellow Ford fully embraced the arts. As a patron, an observer and a practitioner, Mrs. Ford engaged in a lifelong exploration of all things of beauty and inspiration. Exceedingly well-read in poetry and classic literature, Mrs. Ford was often at the center of spirited discussions about the merits of all manner of literary works. Always at the very foundation of her spirit was a great and sincere love of the arts and letters.

In keeping with a generations-old family tradition of philanthropy, Mrs. Ford established the Gertrude C. Ford Foundation in Jackson, Mississippi, with a very generous gift in 1991 to support the arts in Mississippi. In addition to the donation for the construction of the Ford Center, the Foundation supports the USA International Ballet Competition, the Mississippi Opera, Mississippi Museum of Art, University of Southern Mississippi Orchestra and many others.

Mrs. Ford died in September of 1996. She and her husband, Aaron Lane Ford, who was an Ackerman attorney and U.S. congressman representing what was Mississippi's 4th District, are buried in Cuthbert, a small town in southwest Georgia.
